Among key points, in relation to data and sharing of information:

- 90% of disability services are COVID-19 free and the other 10% are so far coping with their outbreaks. Sadly, 10 people have passed away due to COVID-19.
 - (10% represents approx. 100 to 110 registered centres*)
- The Minister is to ask the HPSC to publish disaggregated data to indicate the levels of COVID-19 in disability services.
- The HSE is to develop a protocol for informing families if their family member lives in a setting where someone has contracted COVID-19.

"The figures also show there were 3,244 deaths in nursing homes between January and April this year. There were 73 fatalities occurred in disability centres and 51 in mental health care centres. Of these, Covid-19 accounted for 586 deaths in nursing homes, 16 in disability centres and 14 in mental health centres.

Analysis provided for Nursing Homes but no further breakdown of data to allow assessment of situation in other community residential settings (168 clusters, 1102 cases and 117 deaths).

Outbreak: a single case of disease caused by a significant pathogen (e.g. diphtheria or viral haemorrhagic fever, covid-19) or two or more linked cases of the same illness or the situation where the observed number of cases exceeds the expected number. Outbreaks may be confined to some of the members of one family or may be more widespread and involve cases either locally,

Outbreak can also mean a sudden increase in cases of a disease nationally or internationally.

Cluster: Sometimes groups of cases are confirmed in the same area, for example in a hospital or nursing home. These are known as clusters of cases.
